VAI (2019 / 88 MINS / PG) SCREENING 7PM

Vai is a portmanteau feature film created by nine female Pacific filmmakers and filmed across seven Pacific countries including Fiji, Tonga, Solomon Islands, Kuki Airani (Cook Islands), Samoa, Niue, and Aotearoa (New Zealand). Each of the eight vignettes explores the journey of Vai from a seven year old girl to the grand matriarch of her family. In each of these Pacific nations 'vai' means water.

Beautifully shot, Vai brings together Indigenous cultural and storytelling traditions, all told uniquely from a woman's perspective.

TICKETS: Full \$18; Concession \$15 Arguably one of Australia and New Zealand's most prolific and celebrated filmmakers, Jane Campion has had an extraordinary international career spanning decades. Campion remains the only woman to date to have won the prestigious Palme D'or for her film The Piano (1993) at the Cannes Film Festival. Campion's career traverses feature filmmaking and television however on occasion she has returned to her short film roots, using the form as a means for independent, creative expression.

She Who Must Be Loved is a documentary that tells the epic life story of Alfreda Glynn, the 78 year old Kaytetye woman, stills photographer, co founder of the Central Australian Aboriginal Media Association (CAAMA), and Imparja TV, mother, grandmother, great grandmother, radical, pacifist, grumpy old woman, who in equal measure loves the limelight and total privacy.

Both social history and detective story, this film investigates the mystery behind Glynn's grandmother, who was killed in a massacre. Directed by Glynn's daughter, filmmaker Erica Glynn, the film is an affecting portrait of an iconic figure in Australia's media history.

Emu Runner tells the story of Gem (Rhae-Kye Waites), a nine year girl dealing with the death of her mother in the isolated community located in western NSW. As her father Jay Jay (Wayne Blair) tries to keep the family together, Gem copes with her loss by forging a bond with a wild emu, a bird connecting with her mother's traditional totem animal.

Director Imogen Thomas' debut feature beautifully explores themes of loss, family, Country, and respecting difference. The film was written in consultation with Frayne Barker, an Aboriginal Ngemba woman, from Brewarrina, and with the participation of the local community in its production. Barker has brought to this project her knowledge of the pressing issues and challenges that come from living in this isolated community.

Visualise Your Voice is a practical workshop aimed at culturally and linguistically diverse young women aged 15-19 who aspire to create their own films. This day long workshop focuses on building knowledge of the different pathways for working as a screen practitioner through the creation of self-devised short films and storytelling.

Participants will be mentored by professional screen industry practitioners and educators, having the opportunity to experience different creative roles on a film shoot, using industry-standard equipment to translate their stories to the screen.


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


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
