With problems on the home front, 16 year old Murra is on the verge of lashing out. That is, until her policeman uncle thwarts her self-destructive behaviour with a lifeline: a "photo-safari for at-risk kids". Murra isn't entirely convinced, but she soon joins cantankerous Kylie, uptight Sean, happy-go-lucky Elvis, and camp counsellors Fernando and Michelle on a transformative bus trip to the Pilbara. On the trail, the teens learn about fun, friendship and first crushes, as well as the forces of 'reality' that puncture the bubble of youth.

### **THE GODDESS OF 1967**

2000, 118 mins, English

Revisit the unsettling and saturated world of Clara Law's The Goddess of 1967.

J.M, an avid Japanese car collector (played by Rikiya Kurokawa), travels to rural Australia in response to an advertisement for his dream vehicle - a Citroën DS. nicknamed "The Goddess". J.M. gets more than he bargained for when a blind girl, B.G. (portraved by a young Rose Byrne), answers the door and hitches a ride with him to the outback opal mining town where she grew up. Travelling together in the liminal space of the Citroën, the two outsiders experience flashbacks, and begin to confront past traumas.

### SHIT

2022, 75 mins, English



Shit is a psychological drama which unfolds over one long night of incarceration in a bleak holding cell. Caged for hours on end, Billy, Bobby and Sam reveal their stories. Stories of a life time of violence, of abuse, of institutionalisation, told with unsentimental, sometimes comical, often gut-wrenching insight. They've done something terrible but all they've got to do is keep it together, to keep their mouths zipped. Sam has fallen apart and become a liability, the weak link. Billy and Bobby spend the night trying to hold tight, keeping them solid, a complete three, but life has finally caught up with them.

Disability has been underrepresented on Australian screens. Join us for a special screening and panel discussion that showcases the diversity of human experience but also speaks to the importance of authentic representation when telling stories about disability.

Students have the opportunity to watch two short films that centre disability both on screen and behind the camera, and then join an online panel with the filmmakers to talk about narrative, the filmmaking process, and why we should value seeing different perspectives on screen.

Sweet As is a coming of age road movie following Murra, a 16 year old Indigenous girl in Port Hedland, Western Australia. Always on the edge of trouble, Murra is signed up to a photography camp for at-risk youth. Dubious at first, she ends up having a transformative time, learning about friends, family, and first love.

The film offers opportunities to explore themes about growing up, family, and the teen genre through a First Nations Australian lens.

Following the success of Waru (2017) and Vai (MWFF, 2020), Käinga is the third anthology film in the trilogy produced by Kerry Warkia and Kiel McNaughton. Bringing together underrepresented Asian filmmakers to craft eight unique stories exploring the diverse, evolving, but familiar experiences of Asians trying to make a home in Aotearoa New Zealand.

**IONDAY 27th FEBRUARY, 6:30PM, CINEMA** 

Taking place over five decades in a single house, 11 Rua Road, the walls bear witness to a visiting Chinese daughter hoping to see her father; a young Japanese mother's loneliness and isolation; a Filipino nurse trying to support both her adopted Aotearoa family and her real one in the Philippines; a young Korean girl's confusion with strangers nosing through her house; an Indian daughter trying to connect with her elderly father through technology, an Iranian wife growing restless with the lack of opportunities as an immigrant; a Tamil Eelam sister looking for old memories and a young Chinese-Kiwi mother's confrontation with her neighbour.
